

Discouraging picture of Female Labour Force Participation (LFP) and Entrepreneurial Activity in MENA


- · Low rates of participation despite increased educational attainment

(In % of Population Age Female 15+) Source: World Bank




Percentage of female population aged 25 and + with tertiary schooling completed

Develop loan guarantee schemes to address the problem of lack of guarantees for women without asset
